



How and When to Call Your Doctor

HOW TO CALL: Our office number is 763-587-7916

A doctor is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. After weekday business hours and on the weekends the answering service will take your message and call the on-call doctor.

Your call will be returned within 20 minutes. Please keep your phone nearby and attempt to stay off your phone while waiting for a return call. If you have not heard from a doctor within 20 minutes, please call back and identify your message as a second message. It is possible the on-call doctor may be in a delivery or surgery and cannot return your call immediately. If your second call is not returned, call **Maple Grove Hospital Labor and Delivery at (763)581-2050 or North Memorial Hospital Labor and Delivery at (763)581-8370.**

WHEN TO CALL YOUR DOCTOR: The following are considered urgent and warrant a call **ANYTIME:**

- **WARNING SIGNS IN PREGNANCY:**
 - Vaginal bleeding
 - Severe headache, unresponsive to Tylenol
 - Blurred vision or other unusual visual changes
 - Severe or continued nausea and vomiting
 - Fever over 101F
 - Abdominal pain
 - Sudden decrease in baby's movement (See fetal movement count handout)
 - Leaking of fluid from vagina (possible ruptured membranes)
 - More than four (4) cramps or contractions per hour occurring before 36 weeks.

Labor can begin anytime, but no one can predict precisely when it will begin. Below are some guidelines that will help you know when to call your doctor.

- **SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS OF LABOR**
 - Contractions lasting 45-60 seconds, occurring every 3-5 minutes for an hour or more.
 - Leaking of fluid from vagina (possible ruptured membrane)
 - Severe abdominal pain (the most severe in your life lasting more than a minute)



You do not need to call if you lose your mucous plug or are experiencing “bloody show” (blood tinged mucous discharge). After a vaginal exam it is common to have a small amount of spotting.
